



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

A

T THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON JUNE 24TH, MARILYN COLE gave a report on the events that occurred during the past year.

The fiscal year 1998-99 has brought some interesting changes to COTERC, while at the same time allowing it to develop in new directions.

One of the more significant changes was the hiring of Fran Mason as Administrative Assistant, who took over the daily duties for COTERC including such tasks as responding to phone, mail and email messages; initiating contacts for fundraising and other purposes; managing the weekly bingo fundraising events, as well as others such as barbecues; liaison with Board members and a multitude of other duties too numerous to name. With her appointment the COTERC office has a new phone and fax number. I remain as Executive Director but in a part-time capacity. This has allowed me to pursue other interests while still maintaining close ties with COTERC.

We have also been developing a five-year Masterplan over the past year and are currently putting the finishing touches on it. This Masterplan will allow us to proceed in a systematic fashion to take COTERC to the next level in the future, and to provide

Executive Director's Report Continued guidance for newer Board members.

Here in Canada, while we have been active with our school education program, we made 52 presentations as opposed to 82 in the previous year. This decrease can be attributed to two things: teachers' strikes & work slowdowns, plus a decrease in our volunteer base (due in part to some volunteers moving to other areas). Hopefully we can increase our presentations in the upcoming year by developing a larger volunteer base. Elizabeth Schaeffer was very helpful in this regard. Thanks, Liz for all your help! June Barringham also took on a large load of class presentations, despite her heavy commitment elsewhere. Thanks June!!

During this past year Dr. Louis Pike and Jenny Baboolal worked on developing a presentation aimed at lower grade levels, and we will begin to utilize this new program in the future, so that we can provide programs that suit the age of the students more closely.


Our Tropical Treat held in late September, 1998 was another successful event, generating much-needed funds for Caño Palma Biological Station. This year's event will again be held at the Toronto Zoo Atrium, thanks to the generosity of the Toronto Zoo management. Get out your calendars and set aside October 2nd for this increasingly popular event. We will again have all kinds of exciting things for the live and silent auction, plus a great dinner and dancing. As an extra special feature, our Station Manager from Costa Rica, Ross Ballard will be joining us for Tropical Treat.

I am also pleased to report that we have qualified to receive funding from the Ontario Lottery Corporation to have our Teacher's Manual on Rainforest Conservation printed. We expect to be able to distribute these to teachers in early fall, 1999. This manual has been evolving for

some time and has been scrutinized by a number of experts, all of whom have complimented us on a job well done. I want to thank Joan Watson for her many hours dedicated to illustrating and putting the manual into its final format prior to printing.

We have also seen a change in the membership secretary. Ian Morrison has held this position for several years, and has passed on the mantle to Amanda Stone. John Parry, the Raphia newsletter editor, has also stepped down.

COTERC has been profiled in several guidebooks describing our research station facilities and offering volunteer opportunities, and we have received a great number of enquiries as a result.

We also received funding from the federal government's Environmental Youth Corps program to hire an individual to work at our butterfly garden in the village of Tortuguero, Costa Rica. We are currently negotiating with other groups to take over the daily operation of this garden, now that our grant money from CIDA has been depleted, and we will keep you posted of developments.

Caño Palma Biological Station's facilities are somewhat lacking for large student groups and consequently part of the Masterplan addresses the issue of re-building and renovating some of the current facilities.

Tom Mason has agreed to oversee this project, and we expect to begin the expansion in the late fall or early winter.

Ross Ballard has now been with Caño Palma Biological Station for approximately 1 1/2 years and has been appointed as Station Manager. We are currently seeking an individual to become the Assistant Manager. Ross has recently been able to secure the purchase of a large dugout boat, capable of carrying more passengers and cargo than our other two boats. Those of you who remember the Peregrina (our first boat) will proably feel a bit nostalgic in knowing that it is for sale. The Adelita remains as our back-up and general runaround boat. I have not yet heard whether the new dugout has been named, but I've no doubt that our staff will come up with an appropriate name.

We continue to host students and researchers from various institutions, and with the development of newer and larger facilities, we will be able to attract more in the future. In the meantime, bats and insects appear to be the most popular animals to be studied.

We have hosted visits from the schoolchildren of the village of Tortuguero, and feel that this is an important part of our education component. Although these children have grown up surrounded by the rain forest, many of them still do not have a great appreciation for the diversity of life around them,

In summary, since our early beginnings a short eight years ago, we have made some great strides in certain areas, while the potential remains for us to develop further in other areas. With the Masterplan in place, we will be able to forge ahead into the new Millennium. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our many volunteers (from the Board of Directors to those who help at our fundraising events). A charity such as COTERC could not exist without your help and support.

PROYECTO CAMPANARIO

OR SOME YEARS NOW, COTERC HAS HAD A RE-LATIONSHIP WITH A "sister" research facility known as Proyecto Campanario. Its founder and director Nancy Aitken has done numerous favours for COTERC and Caño Palma Biological Station, taking care of business in San Jose, Costa Rica. We thought you might enjoy hearing about Campanario, as narrated by a volunteer biologist who recently visited the site.

I was more than ready to stretch my legs after 6 hours on the public bus from San Jose to the small riverside town of Sierpe in the northern end of the Osa Peninsula. Other members of my group had already arrived and were quickly loading gear and supplies into the boat while the tide was still high. As the tide goes down and the river empties, sometimes sandbars and breaking waves become hazards at the mouth of the river, so we were all in a hurry to travel with the high tide.

With everyone accounted for and a week's supply of food on board, we began our 90 minute trip down the wide winding river, through the largest mangrove reserve in Central America, to the ocean where we turned south and followed the coast to Proyecto Campanario. Campanario is a private biological reserve originally purchased a decade ago by a small group of teachers and ex-Peace Corps volunteers, and is now managed by Nancy Aitken. The reserve protects nearly 65 hectares of tropical wet forest adjacent to Corcovado National Park and serves as a center for conservation, research and education. The large and comfortable field station, with running water, solar electricity and 24 beds, enables Campanario to host scientists, school groups and adventurous

green travellers.

The unmistakable raucous call of the Scarlet Macaw was my alarm clock early the next morning. I went out of my room onto the second floor balcony overlooking the ocean to find the bird in an almond tree only a coconut's throw away. After watching the bird's every move for 10 minutes, my gaze eventually drifted toward the horizon to find two Humpback whales spouting off about a kilometer from shore.

The week on the Osa was marked with memorable sightings. Gangs of Coati along the trail were startled by my evening walks, but the Northern Tamandua took a few curious steps in my direction. It was also thrilling to see Blue-capped Manakins, Spider monkeys, Green Poison-arrow frogs, Kingfishers, Chestnutmandibled Toucans, Long-tailed Hermits, Margay, White Hawk and Bellbird, to name just a few.

TOURISTS FLOCKING TO COSTA RICA

CCORDING TO AN ARTICLE IN THE TICO TIMES WRITTEN BY Christine Pratt (May 21, 1999), more than one million foreign tourists will visit Costa Rica this year, the majority of whom will come from Canada (42,097), the United States (347,442) and Mexico (30,109) - a total of 44.5%). Central American visitors were in second place, accounting for 31.2%. In contrast German and Italian tourists stayed away, contributing to a decline in total number of Europeans.

One can only hope that the Costa Rican government is aware of the heavy impact such numbers of tourists can have on the resources of the country, and take steps to protect its natural wonders even more vigorously, rather than give in to the temptations of land developers, etc. who want to exploit this huge potential market.
